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# Public Water Management in Germany – a tried and true tradition!

• High quality drinking water

- Sanitary and environmentally friendly wastewater/sewage disposal
- Full service coverage: Priority for local ties, permanent, reliable, affordable service, 24/365
- Improvement of human health and protection of groundwater, and of surface bodies of water
- Protection from floods and storm surges
- Common mission of securing livelihood





#### The special governance Challenge of water management

- Water Not just any commodity, A very special asset: a life necessity, a natural resource, a natural force with strong local implications
- Drinking water and wastewater: A public duty incumbent upon public – ideally decentralized – municipal institutions
- But increasing need for cooperation beyond municipal limits:
  - urban growth
  - water resources
  - drainage
  - scale effect (e.g. WWTP's)

### Water utilities in Germany predominatly publicly owned



Legal structure	Sewage treatment	Water supply
Public service legal structures	90%	60%
Public companies/ municipal companies (PLC/Ltd. Co.)	from total 28 % associations or similar	from total 23 % associations or similar
Public-private partnerships		24 %
Other private companies	<10%	16%

# Stein-Hardenberg Reforms created - citizens' self-administration in communities of solidarity as a counterweight to the state

- Exemption of citizens from the dependence on the state
- Citizens identification with the state versus recipients of orders in an authoritarian state
- Mobilizing local knowledge and commitment of citizens
- Participation and co-responsibility of citizens





#### Municipalities determine their own organizational forms: > Local self-administration protected by the Constitution!

#### Organizational forms:

- Government operated system
- Municipal company, public law company
- Special-purpose association
- Water and soil association
- Special legal association (in North-Rhine-Westphalia)
- Other forms of inter-municipal cooperation

# **A Successful System**

#### **Water and soil associations, dike and sluice associations** Currently more than 12.000 in Germany

**1000 AD: First dike watches and dike associations** 

Middle Ages: Irrigation + drainage associations

- Water supply, sewage treatment and also maintenance of bodies of water
- Federal Water Association Law (since 1991 implementational state laws)
- State-level supervision

# A Successful System

#### **Special-purpose associations**

have existed in Germany since the late 19<sup>th</sup> century. Today, there are several thousand, and more all the time, especially in rural areas, for regional bulk water supply and intermunicipal waste water treatment

- Associations of municipal bodies
- Joint management of certain public missions, e.g. water supply/wastewater disposal
- Each state has laws regulating these associations
- Laws for special legal associations in North Rhine-Westphalia
- Members (public; private, if necessary for the task)
- Voluntary or mandatory





**Citizens' involvement is the original form of municipal self-administration** Federal Constitutional Court, July 7, 1960, BVerfGE 11, pp. 266, 276:

"Part of the essence of municipal self-administration, as it emerged under the simpler conditions of the 19<sup>th</sup> century, is that it is borne by the collaboration of respected citizens particularly familiar with local conditions, and that it is oriented toward the particular needs of the local community."

# The German law of *municipal self-administration* contains similar stipulations of the research results of Elinor Ostrom *"Governing the Commons*" (1990)

", The institutionalized cooperation of stakeholders is superior to state control and privatization in managing scarce natural resources!"





# **Municipal self-administration**

The underlying values are:

Solidarity, commonality, cooperation

Societal cohesion and responsibility

Individuals have to get involved and contribute to the common success

**Common negotiation about institutional implementation** 

> Municipalities are closer to the problem, and find better solutions than far-away government bodies!





# Clues for the paths to success: Define and guarantee framework conditions!

- > Set standards: Pass laws and monitor their
- > implementation, but allow for some leeway!
- > Determine responsibilities: Who is in charge?
- > Ensure financing: Consumer-appropriate, cost-accurate,
- Democratic control: Subsidiarity self-administration federalism

- Know-how: Training tradesmanship science
- > Partnership: Organize cooperation of people with the know-how
- Managing the natural monopoly: Benchmarking (voluntary), cost control, transparency
- Staying close to the citizens: Municipal organization with government supervision, involving consumers





#### Specific Challenges for inter-municipal Water Utilities

- Economic structural change and financial crisis
- Changes in the population structure
- Climate change, increased numbers of droughts and heavy-rain events
- New water management challenges (trace materials)
- Sustainable investments in infrastructure



- Secret contracts between local governments and private companies are being hardly critizised
- Reclaiming Transparency in the public management
- Ensuring that the chain of democratic legitimacy works
- European Free Trade Agreements (CETA, TTIP, TISA)







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
